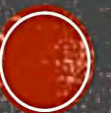






ENGAGEMENT AND COMMUNITY BELONGING

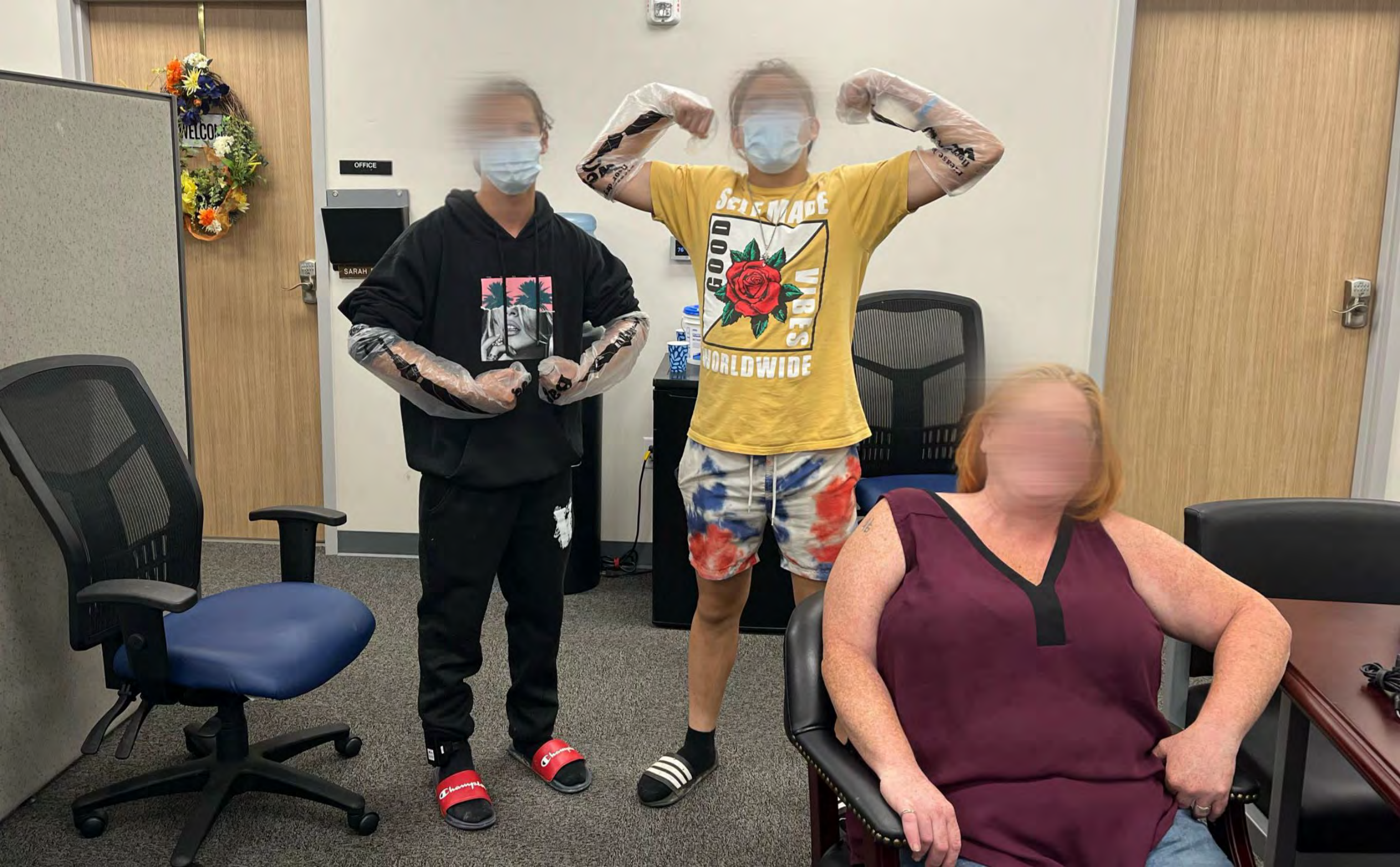
